

Invitation to a side event to the 23rd Human Rights Council session:

Evaluating conditions for peaceful, transparent, free and fair elections in Zimbabwe

Friday, 7 June 2013, 10.00 – 12.00 pm, Geneva, Palais des Nations, Room IX

Zimbabwe is scheduled to hold general elections before the end of 2013. Past elections in the country have been marred by violence and attacks on human rights defenders and the rule of law more generally. In the period leading to the 2013 elections, there have been several incidents of crackdown on political dissents and independent voices. The impunity enjoyed by past and current perpetrators electoral violence has continued to exacerbate fears for the integrity, peaceful conduct and fairness of the upcoming elections. This parallel event will discuss past and present challenges to the rule of law in Zimbabwe in the context of the upcoming elections and the need for the international community to remain vigilant about the necessity for free, fair and peaceful elections in the country.
