Age assessment conducted even when the child has a valid passport stating their age, children considered to be adults, which leads to lack of access to their rights as children. CRC issued interim measures in a number of these cases against Spain, which Spain has yet to implement Request for interim measures has also been sent to ECtHR. Similar problems with age assessment procedures arise in Italy and Greece.
