







Transnational Exchange Roundtable

Access to Justice for Children Accused and Suspect in Criminal Proceedings

ACCESS project

Brussels

18-19 March 2025

The exchange roundtable brings together justice professionals from different professional groups – lawyers, judges, prosecutors, law enforcement professionals, social workers and parole officers – for an exchange of good practices and challenges faced by children in criminal proceedings, in light of EU Directive 2016/800 on procedural safeguards for children who are suspects or accused persons in criminal proceedings.

The specific focus of the roundtable will be on equality in proceedings, possible discrimination, and the disproportionate impact of criminal proceedings on children belonging to different minority groups, including, for instance, children with disabilities, Roma children, children with a migration background, and LGBTI+ children. The question of children below the age of criminal responsibility in the target countries and especially their access to procedural safeguards will be discussed. The focus topics of the roundtable have been selected following a baseline study, carried out in the project countries at the beginning of the project, analysing challenges and good practices related to the implementation of Directive 2016/800 and children's access to justice in criminal proceedings.

Day 1 of the roundtable focuses on cross-professional networking and discussion on cross-cutting issues, with the involvement of keynote speakers. During day 2 participants are divided into separate workshops per professional group (1: lawyers, 2: judges, 3: prosecutors and law enforcement personnel, 4: social workers and probation officers), and by national groups to discuss specific issues relevant to their professional focus area, and country of origin.

The Access to Justice for Children Accused and Suspect in Criminal Proceedings (ACCESS) project aims to foster EU-wide effective and non-discriminatory access to justice for children in criminal proceedings, and respect for children's procedural rights amongst legal and other professionals. The project aims to foster the effective application of Directive 2016/800 by addressing the gaps identified in access to procedural rights through peer exchange among justice professionals from six EU countries (Belgium, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, the Netherlands, Poland, and Slovakia). These will become ambassadors of change in follow-up national seminars, where further stakeholders will be involved.
